Hard Disk Partitions ...How (and Why)

With Michael Horowitz

Michael Horowitz will demonstrate how (and why) to partition your hard drive.

Generally, new computers ship with a C disk the full size of the hard disk. Hard disks, however, can be divided into logical pieces called partitions. For example, a computer with a single hard disk can have Windows assign "C" and "E" and "F" to different portions/partitions of the disk.

Have you ever noticed that Windows thinks the hard disk is smaller than it should be? One reason for this is that the computer manufacturer may have configured the hard disk with a partition that is hidden from Windows.

In this presentation, [Michael Horowitz](#) will explain what partitions are, the rules and software for creating them, and the many purposes they can serve.

Multi-Booting

One purpose is to run more than one copy of Windows on a single computer, the official term for this being "multi-booting." Why do so?

For Backup: When trouble strikes and Windows breaks, it's nice to have an extra copy lying around that you can

immediately use for a restore—like a spare tire in the trunk. Then, you can fix the broken copy of Windows at your leisure, or just walk away from it.

For Family Amity: Children who like computers are a joy, but sooner or later, they are bound to cause problems for your computer. With partitions, you can have a copy of Windows for the adults and a separate copy for children.

For Smooth Bug Fixes: Sometimes applying patches (aka bug fixes) breaks more things than it fixes. How many of you are running Windows XP Service Pack 1 and are hesitant to apply SP2? With partitions you can have a backup copy of Windows to use in case applying bug fixes causes problems.

To Run Two or More Operating Systems: You are not limited to two copies of Windows. Using partitions enables you to run any two Operating Systems on one computer. Want to make the transition from Windows 98/Me to XP slowly rather than in a big bang? Run them both on one computer. Partitions are the foundation for Apple's Bootcamp software that lets you run Windows XP on an Intel-based Macintosh computer.

There are even more reasons to use partitions. Come hear for yourself.

Steel studs have preformed holes built in. The manufacturers claim that this is to allow electric wires to easily pass through the material, but the Electronic Frontier and other privacy advocates claim this is really a back door making it easier for the government to look through the partitions.



Wood studs are much more resistant to this type of attack, but even they are not completely safe. One must always be on the look-

out for knot holes, and this system is also susceptible to hidden termite attacks.

Book Review: **Understanding Adobe Photoshop: Digital Imaging Concepts and Techniques** by Richard Harrington, **Peachpit Press** (Berkeley, 2006)

First I was disappointed then delighted! It was the title of this book, *Understanding....*, that particularly appealed to me. I hoped to learn more of the concepts underlying the Photoshop techniques that I use, and those that I hope to use. When I first opened it, I sighed, "Another book of step-by-step techniques," but I was wrong. The book is not exactly what I expected, but it has definitely increased my understanding of Photoshop and improved my skills.

A Different Pedagogical Approach

The author's approach reflects his background as a college teacher. He effectively combines clear, concise explanations of underlying technology with inductive, learn-by-doing examples and exercises. Examples are lucid and to the point. Conversely, step-by-step instructions often introduce terminology or concepts, e.g., "In order to crop nondestructively, you must 'float' the Background layer." In interspersing concepts with techniques, the author wastes no words!

The order of the topics differs from that of most other Photoshop books I have seen: Harrington introduces some features typically regarded as intermediate/advanced early and briefly—just enough so that the reader glimpses the concept—and then expands on them later in the book. For example, he introduces actions and channels in Chapter 2!

Rather than dealing only with the basics of a given technique in an early chapter, with advanced applications near the end of the book, Harrington progresses from the basics to the advanced fairly rapidly, within a single chapter. Thus, the chapter on Selections moves quickly, in 24 pages, from

the marquee tools to selections using paths, channels, or calculations. The chapter on sizing includes not only resizing and cropping but also perspective and transform tools.

I was surprised to see that the first chapter dealing overtly with layers is Chapter 7, Layer Masking, but then I discovered that I was using layers in the exercises much earlier in the book. (I very much like this inductive learning style, but it is probably not for everyone.)

For readers who already use Photoshop there may be an "AHA!" moment, where the writer makes a previous puzzle fall into place. The book's explanations of blending modes and filters may be the best that I have seen.

The book's many useful "extras" include a list of URLs for public domain images, snippets of Photoshop history, and profiles of some professional photographers. For relatively new features, the author indicates the Photoshop version in which each was introduced.

The included DVD has many demos and exercises. In addition to those corresponding to sections in the book, additional photographs invite the reader to "play" on his/her own.

Although the cover indicates the level as Beginner/Intermediate, this may not be the best tool for many beginners just starting with the digital darkroom. However, for those with some exposure to imaging software, or for someone learning in a class, it offers a wealth of information and a rapid path to increased understanding of Photoshop. *Mary Ginsburg, treasurer@nypceducation.org*
